Brunswick House have been working on a Protect the Earth Arts & Crafts Piece after the idea came about from one of their chatterbox club discussions, where they were reflecting on the pandemic and how it had affected their lives and the world.

The artwork took two days to create. First of all, they created the rainbow as a symbol of protection. They looked at the Noah's Arc story to illustrate how throughout history, the rainbow has been used to symbolise God's protection over the world and everything living on it, as well as an image that could be seen in people's windows throughout the pandemic. The residents enjoyed making the rainbow out of scrunched up tissue paper. They then moved onto making the Earth, animals and human family. The Earth was made of tissue paper, the animals and human family were images coloured in by the residents. The artwork was finished off with 3 key words - Protect, Love and Peace.

BRUNSWICK HOUSE HAVE BEEN GETTING CREATIVE WITH MESSY VINTAGE.

A way of combining a story, music and crafts together into one session. July's Messy Vintage focus was William Wordsworth's poem "I wandered lonely as a cloud".

The session started with one of the residents reading out the famous poem. They then listened to a recorded version twice. The idea behind listening to the poem three times is to help the words and meaning of the poem sink into their thoughts, helping the residents reflect on the message behind the words.

When Wordsworth saw the golden daffodils dancing in the breeze, they lifted his spirits and put him in a happy and content place. A place far away from his worries and problems. For that moment he sensed himself lifted and filled with hope and peace.

The group then shared experiences of times in their own lives when they had felt like Wordsworth. When a song, an image or maybe a flower had made them feel lifted and happy, casting away their troubles.

Once the artwork was complete, the residents enjoyed listening to the song - all things bright and beautiful, reflecting on things bright and beautiful that had changed their lives for the better and given them the sense that they were lifted.

The artwork is now on display on the second-floor dining room at Brunswick House with the poem next to it for all residents and their families to read and enjoy.








ERNIE TURNS 100
